

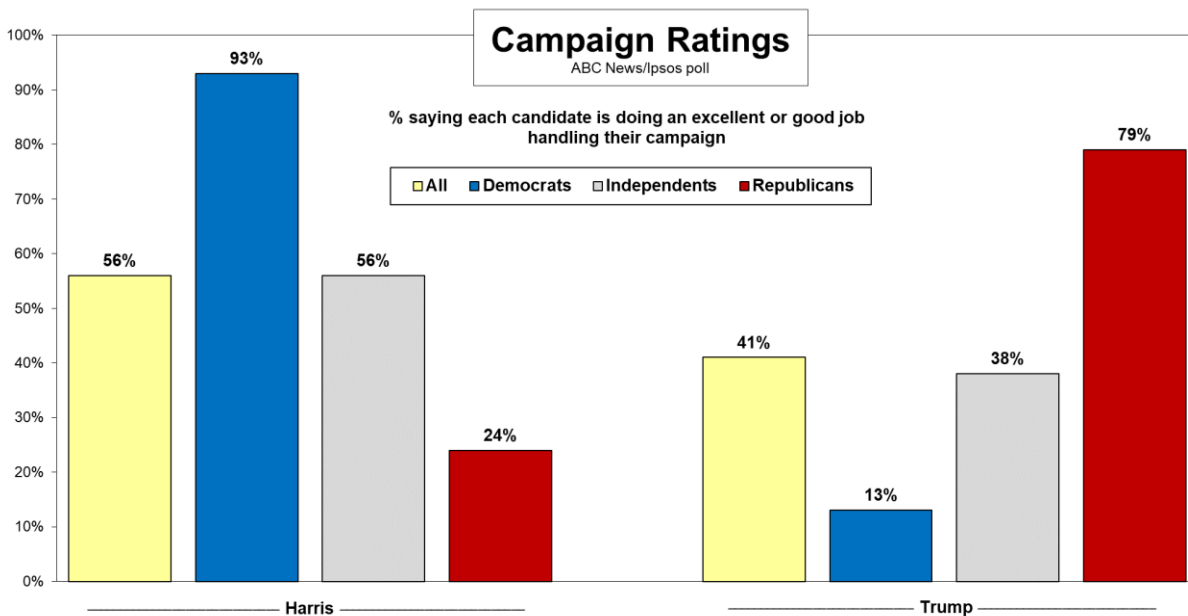
Election Contest Stays Competitive; Convention Bounce Is a No-Show

Kamala Harris has maintained her advantages over Donald Trump on personal attributes and broadly is seen as running the better presidential campaign in a new ABC News/Ipsos poll, with comparative doubts about Trump’s campaign in his base and the political center alike.

The race between them remains close, with no overall bounce in support for Harris out of her nominating convention, albeit with a wider gender gap. Trump, too, was bounce-free after his convention in July, indicating the locked-in nature of their highly polarized contest as it enters its final two months.

Results show Harris’ competitiveness as a walk-on candidate. Fifty-six percent of Americans in the national survey say she has done an excellent or good job running her campaign, compared with 41 percent who say the same for Trump. Most, instead, rate Trump’s campaign negatively.

Notably, 93 percent of Democrats and 56 percent of independents rate Harris’ campaign positively, as do 24 percent of Republicans in this poll, produced for ABC by [Langer Research Associates](#) with fieldwork by [Ipsos](#). Fewer across groups see Trump’s campaign positively – 79 percent of Republicans, 38 percent of independents and 13 percent of Democrats.



Harris’ supporters are 14 percentage points more apt than Trump’s to be satisfied with the matchup, similar to pre-convention results. And the public by a 6-point margin, 43-37 percent, picks Harris to win the presidential debate Sept. 10 on ABC.

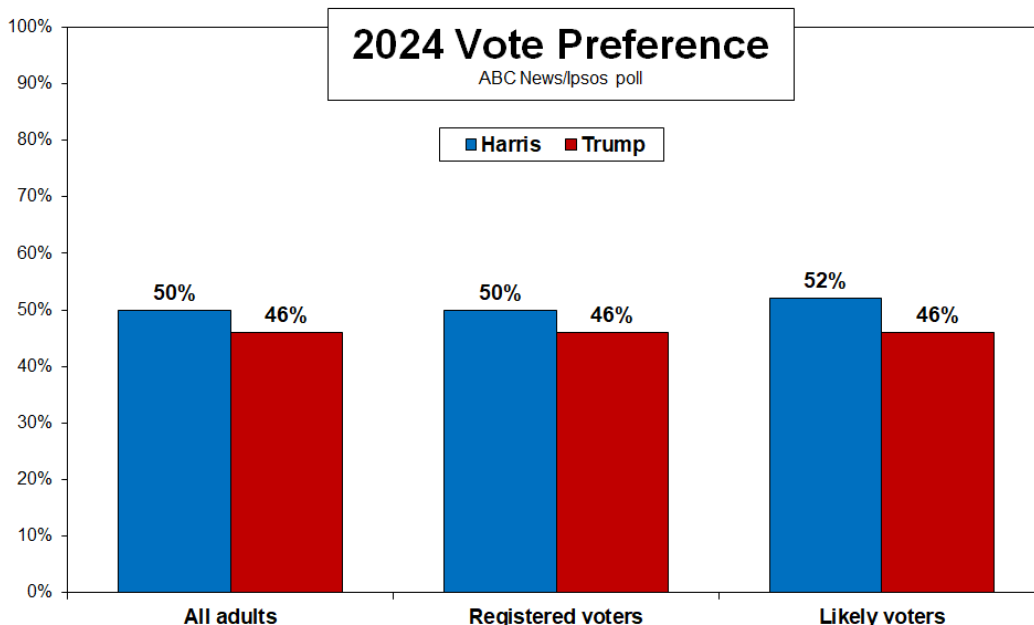
Here, too, Harris shows more strength in her base – 86 percent of Democrats expect her to win the debate, while 79 percent of Republicans expect Trump to win it. In the political center, independents pick Harris by 7 points.

Harris also leads in the level of angst among her supporters. Seventy-five percent of them say it would be “a crisis” if Trump were elected, a sentiment that could motivate turnout. Fewer Trump supporters, but still 67 percent, see a Harris win as a crisis.

As to running mates, Tim Walz continues to win a warmer welcome than JD Vance. Americans divide essentially evenly, 49-50 percent, in confidence that Walz would be qualified to take over as president, while 57 percent aren’t confident that Vance is qualified. And Walz is seen favorably by 42-31 percent, while Vance is underwater in favorability, 32-44 percent. About a quarter are unready to express an opinion of either.

At the same time, Trump continues to lead on the top concerns in the race, trust to handle the economy in general and inflation in particular, both by 8 points, and by 9 points on the immigration situation at the U.S.-Mexico border, albeit a lower-rated issue in importance in previous data. Trump also benefits from the fact that 46 percent call Harris too liberal – though, on the other hand, 43 percent call him too conservative.

THE RACE – All in all, the horse race is essentially the same now as it was before the Democratic convention – 50-46 percent, Harris-Trump, among all adults and registered voters alike, and 52-46 percent among likely voters. That’s a slight Harris lead in the first case and a full lead among likely voters. (Results exclude those who say they wouldn’t vote.)



While the overall numbers are essentially unchanged from before the convention, the gender gap has widened. Harris leads by 13 points among women, 54-41 percent, while it's Trump +5 points among men, 51-46 percent, for an 18-point gap. (The Trump-Harris difference among men is not statistically significant.) Pre-convention, Harris had been a slight +6 points among women and a non-significant +3 among men, a 3-point gap. The gender gap now is more in line with recent elections, an average of 19 points in exit polls since 1996.

Much of the moves among women and men have occurred among white people. White women have gone from +13 points for Trump pre-convention to a virtual dead heat (Trump +2) now; white men, from +13 points for Trump before the convention to +21 points now.

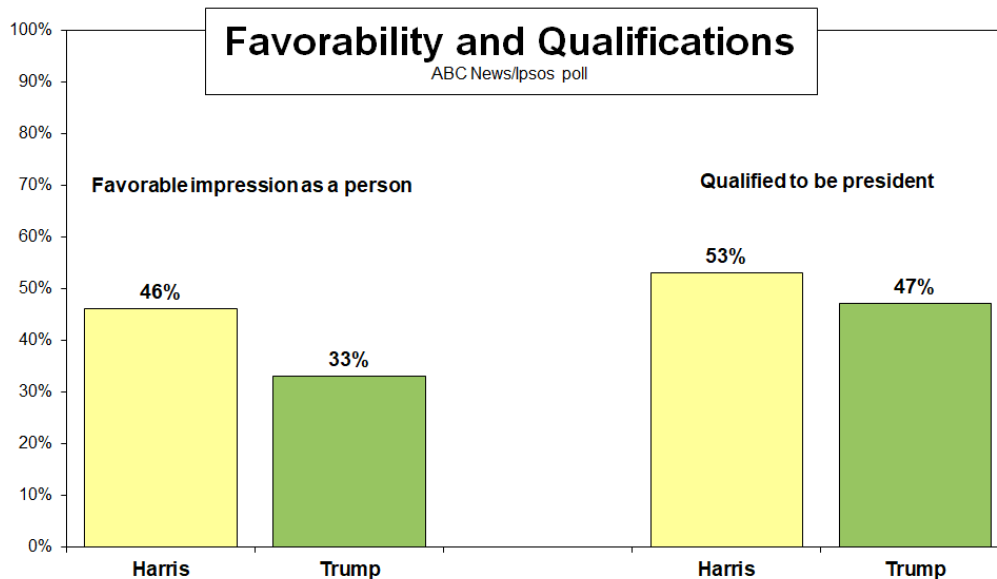
With Robert F. Kennedy Jr. suspending his campaign and backing Trump, the poll finds similar results when the remaining independent and minor-party candidates are included: overall, another slight +4 points for Harris among all adults (49-45 percent) and +5 points among both registered voters (50-45 percent) and likely voters (51-46 percent).

Any help for Trump from Kennedy is scant. Seventy-nine percent overall say Kennedy's support makes no difference in their choice. Twelve percent say it makes them more likely to support Trump – but nearly all who say so are Republicans and GOP-leaning independents, so apt to be Trump supporters in the first place. Nine percent overall – nearly all Democrats and Democratic leaners – say Kennedy's endorsement leaves them less likely to support Trump.

In terms of intensity, 64 percent of Harris' supporters back her strongly; one of the few measures to shift, this is up slightly from 60 percent before the convention. Sixty percent of Trump's support is strong, unchanged. For comparison, Joe Biden, in July, had just 34 percent strong support.

Most vote preferences look locked in. Among Americans who don't currently support Harris, 86 percent rule out doing so, and among people who don't currently support Trump, 89 percent wouldn't consider him. Among likely voters, these rise to 96 and 97 percent, respectively. As such, getting out the vote likely will be more fruitful than trying to change people's minds.

ATTRIBUTES – Compared to pre-convention results, Harris has retained her lead on personal attributes. These include favorability – 46 percent see Harris favorably as a person, vs. 33 percent for Trump – and (more closely) being seen as qualified for the office, 53 percent for Harris, 47 percent for Trump.



In a list of other attributes, Harris leads Trump by a broad 32 points on having the physical health for the job (57-25 percent), 18 points on honesty and trustworthiness (43-25 percent), 10 points on mental acuity (47-37 percent), 8 points on understanding the problems of people like you (41-33 percent) and 7 points on representing your personal values (41-34 percent). All these closely reflect pre-convention results.

On some of these, again, partisan results are striking. While 91 percent of Democrats see Harris favorably as a person, 72 percent of Republicans say the same about Trump. Among independents, 44 percent see Harris favorably, vs. 28 percent who see Trump favorably.

In another example of a partisan differential, 88 percent of Democrats say that being honest and trustworthy applies more to Harris than to Trump. Many fewer Republicans, 61 percent, say it applies more to Trump than to Harris. (Instead, 30 percent of Republicans say it applies to neither.) Indeed, in each head-to-head test of personal attributes in this survey, Harris both leads among independents and does better among Democrats than Trump does among Republicans.

ISSUES – Partisanship works the other way on the two top issues. Ninety percent of Republicans trust Trump more on the economy, while fewer Democrats, 82 percent, trust Harris more, and independents pick Trump by 14 points. On inflation, similarly, 88 percent of Republicans pick Trump, while fewer Democrats prefer Harris, 79 percent, and independents again side with Trump by 14 points.

On immigration, as well, 90 percent of Republicans prefer Trump, while fewer Democrats, 79 percent, trust Harris. Independents prefer Trump by 16 points. Then again, Harris does better in her base and with independents on a variety of other issues, most widely on handling abortion and race relations.

Among all adults, out of 11 issues tested in this survey there are four on which Trump has the lead – in addition to the economy and inflation, these are immigration and handling the Israel/Hamas war – and six on which Harris leads. They’re tied in trust to handle one other, crime and safety, an issue on which Trump had led Biden by 7 points in July.

That said, not all issues are created equal; to the extent the focus is on the economy, Trump benefits – not a surprise given the 40-year high in inflation that occurred on Biden’s watch.

NEITHER – Views on the choice of candidates are better than in July, but far from ideal. The public by 53-45 percent is more apt to be dissatisfied than satisfied with a Harris-Trump contest. But that compares with 71-28 percent in July, with Biden in the race. The difference reflects more Democrats and Democratic-leaning independents on board with Harris than with Biden.

Dissatisfaction shows up in preferences on issues and attributes as well. Anywhere from 15 to 26 percent don’t trust either candidate to handle the issues tested in this survey (peaking on the Israel/Hamas war). And 15 to 30 percent say each item on the attributes list doesn’t apply to either candidate; that peaks in the number who see neither as honest and trustworthy.

That said, some of that dissatisfaction reflects the views of people who are less likely to vote. Registered voters on average are 5 points less apt than all adults to pick neither candidate on issues and attributes alike, and likely voters on average are 10 points less likely to do so.

METHODOLOGY – This ABC News/Ipsos poll was conducted online via the probability-based Ipsos KnowledgePanel® Aug. 23-27, 2024, in English and Spanish, among a random national sample of 2,496 adults. Partisan divisions are 29-29-30 percent, Democrats-Republicans-independents. Results have a margin of [sampling error](#) of 2 percentage points, including the design effect, for the full sample. Sampling error is not the only source of differences in polls.
